- On Nov. 8 the Bayside Community Center held "Celebrating Success" in the Wyndham Emerald Plaza Hotel Crystal Ballroom and presented the 2002 Leadership Awards. The center, which helps new immigrants adjust to American society in San Diego, is celebrating its 70th anniversary. The organization was originally located downtown on Union Street. Leadership Award Winners are San Diego Police Chief David Bejarano; Yvonne Campbell, deputy director, North Central Regional Health & Human Services (retired); San Diego City Councilwoman Donna Frye; Janet Wood, small business manager, City of San Diego Neighborhood Revitalization Programs; and all members of the Social Service Auxiliary.
- The Douglas Wilson Companies hosted an extraordinary grand opening celebration of the Parkloft luxury residential loft complex, 877 Island Ave., on Oct. 19. The sides of the building were bathed in a violet glow and spotlights reached

up through the night sky. "Bohemian Nights" was the evening's theme. Dancers, a street percussionist and a stilt walker greeted guests when they arrived. A performer handed me a set of drum sticks and held up a plastic bucket to beat on, and I demonstrated a serious lack of rhythm.
